

CELEBRATE JOHN BROWN DAY.

North Elba Residents Hold Services at His Grave.

To-day is John Brown day, and at North Elba, an Adirondack hamlet, commemorative exercises have been arranged in eulogy of the liberator, who forfeited his life in an attempt to stir the slaves of the South to an uprising against their bondage. The body of "John Brown, of Ossawatimie," is buried at North Elba, and the grave is marked by an enormous boulder.

At 10:30 o'clock this morning, the North Elba Methodist Church bell tolled for ten minutes, before the exercises began. Frank B. Sanborn, friend and biographer of John Brown, and Dean Kelly Miller, of Howard University, spoke at the Happy Hour Theatre. In the afternoon, the Lake Placid band played at the grave of John Brown, the Rev. E. A. Braman offered prayer, and a tablet was unveiled. Wendell Phillips's oration at the burial of John Brown was read by Prof. Riggs. The speakers included John E. Milholland, Rabbi Stephen Wise, and B. R. Brewster.

John Brown, a Connecticut Yankee, was executed by the State of Virginia after he had led a band in an attack upon the United States arsenal at Harper's Ferry, Va., in 1859. He had been a leader in the fighting over slavery in Kansas.
